Functional Pragmatic Approach Empowering Communication Skills

A functional pragmatic approach to language therapy prioritizes the development of functional communication skills that enable individuals to

- Initiate and maintain conversations
- Engaging in turntaking asking questions and providing relevant responses
- Express needs and wants
- Clearly communicating desires and requests
- Negotiate and resolve conflicts
- Using language to manage disagreements and find solutions
- Socialize and build relationships
- Engaging in social interactions understanding social cues
- 2 and maintaining appropriate social distance
- Navigate complex environments Using language to access information follow instructions and solve problems in realworld settings

Examples of Functional Pragmatic Interventions

Therapists employing this approach utilize various strategies to foster communicative competence

- Roleplaying Simulating real life situations to practice communication skills in different contexts
- Social stories Using illustrated narratives to explain social situations and expected behaviors
- Video modeling Demonstrating appropriate communication skills through video clips
- Conversation analysis Analyzing recorded conversations to identify strengths and areas for improvement
- Functional communication training FCT Teaching alternative communication methods to express needs and wants such as picture exchange systems PECS or sign language
